October Meeting Report

Dr Anthony Joshua, Director of Oncology at the Garvan Institute of Medical Research and Conjoint Assoc. Prof. at St. Vincent's Clinical School was our guest speaker for our October meeting. In 2008 he joined the Princess Margaret Cancer Center in Toronto as a Staff Oncologist and returned to Australia last year. His presentation was entitled "New Understandings in Prostate Cancer - the science and the treatment".

Dr Joshua said that his treatment of a patient began after a radical prostatectomy and radiation treatment had failed to stop the spread of prostate cancer. He explained that prostate cancer feeds on testosterone and whilst it was possible to turn off the testosterone in men with hormone therapy, the prostate cancer can then make its own testosterone and the cancer eventually becomes

castration resistant and requires chemotherapy with drugs such as docetaxel.

The results of the CHARTED study showed that the use of chemotherapy, when combined with hormone therapy (androgen deprivation therapy (ADT), was shown to be very effective in prolonging the survival rate.

Docetaxel has been the chemotherapy drug for men whose prostate cancer was no longer responding to hormone treatments, but the next generation drug Cabazitaxel may prove to be more effective.

New ADT drugs such as Enzalutamide and Abiraterone have minimal side effects

Dr Joshua explained that Radium-223 Therapy is a treatment that is used for people who have prostate cancer that has spread, or metastasised, to the bones. It targets the cancer cells in the bone, leading to the tumours shrinking in size, or even disappearing altogether. It is also used to reduce or diminish pain that can be associated with cancer in the bones.

Denosumab helps to make the bones stronger so that the cancer can't as easily cause pain, reduces the risk of fractures, but doesn't make you live longer.

Research is now concentrating on developing therapeutic vaccines that can stimulate a person's immune responses against cancers. Unlike traditional vaccines that prevent disease, a therapeutic vaccine will be a treatment that tells the immune system to attack the cancer, as if it were an infectious disease.

Dr Joshua was confident that new drugs would be available very soon to help in the fight against prostate cancer.

His presentation was well received by all our members and we thank him for coming to be our guest speaker.

Time to get moving

Exercise is now seen as such an important part of treatment for diseases such as cancer that doctors are starting to specifically recommend it to patients. Unfortunately it's not so easy to get people moving. An Australian trial called ENGAGE has asked how we can encourage our blokes to exercise after a diagnosis of prostate cancer.

Treatments for older men

That many men die with prostate cancer rather than of prostate cancer is often the basis behind the decision by older men to not treat this cancer. However the past two decades has brought us effective new therapies, reduced risks of side-effects from surgery and radiotherapy and an increase in life expectancy for all men. Often men above 75 years of age that are diagnosed with prostate cancer are otherwise healthy, and they look forward to many more healthy years. It's time to look more closely at the effects of treating prostate cancer in older men.

What's good for the heart can be good for prostate cancer

It's often said that "what's good for the heart is good for the prostate" and in many ways this is true. A healthy diet and exercise will help prevent and manage prostate cancer as well as heart disease. But does this saying hold true for heart disease medications? It's hoped that pharmaceuticals such as statins could also prevent or treat prostate cancer, but after many

studies, the evidence is inconclusive. A new report recommends that specific randomised controlled trials are needed as the only studies that can properly address this question.

Clinic Trial Recruitment

Please find below the details of a clinical trial that is currently recruiting participants. Participation in this study is entirely voluntary.

Study title

A Novel Liver Targeted Testosterone Therapy for Sarcopenia in Androgen Deprived Men with Prostate Cancer - A Blinded Randomized Controlled Trial

Lead investigators

Prof Ken Ho, Princess Alexandra Hospital and Dr Anojan Navaratnam, Princess Alexandra and Greenslopes Hospitals in QLD

Summary of project

Androgen deprivation therapy is an effective treatment for prostate cancer but it can cause muscle weakness and wasting, known as sarcopenia. A new testosterone treatment has been developed to prevent the breakdown of skeletal muscle protein in the liver. We have shown that there is no increase in testosterone levels outside the liver and therefore should not affect prostate cancer progression. Taken by mouth, this form of testosterone treatment stimulates the synthesis of protein in muscle. This project will determine whether this new treatment prevents muscle wasting in men taking androgen deprivation therapy.

Men on the trial will be randomised into groups taking either the treatment or placebo. Scans for lean body mass will be used to determine how effective the treatment is for preventing sarcopenia.
