Alex Chesser, District Officer from the Northern Beaches Rural Fire Brigade, will speak to us at our March meeting. Living in such a beautiful area surrounded by bush we must all be aware of the dangers of bushfires. Please come along and hear what Alex has to say.

February Meeting Report.

Our first speaker for 2018 was Dr Amy Teh, Radiation Oncologist at the Sydney Adventist Hospital. Amy gave an analogy of prostate cancer as weeds in a garden with the need to eradicate them before they spread and took over the garden.

Many of our members were able to relate to this as Amy detailed the treatments available and which patients were suitable for different options.

Multi-disciplinary teams now meet to discuss each patient's case treatment and design radiotherapy and dosage for each individual.

Dr Teh continued to describe the methods of treating prostate cancer and the advances that are being made to target the cancer more precisely.

A very interesting evening with an impressively knowledgeable doctor, enjoyed by all.

Early Detection Blood Test

A new, non-invasive blood test can reliably detect prostate cancer in patients with inconclusive PSA tests, the test's developer, CellMax Life, recently announced.

Researchers say the company's circulating tumour cell (CTC) blood test could reduce the

number of unnecessary biopsies by up to 90 percent.

A significant number of men who undergo PSA screening receive an indeterminate, or “gray zone,” result. Three out of four of these patients have a negative biopsy. Unnecessary prostate biopsies present a significant risk for side effects, including fever, infection, and bleeding. Some of these patients may require hospitalization.

Tests currently used to determine the need for biopsy, based on elevated PSA levels, have insufficient specificity and sensitivity, which leads to unnecessary biopsies in a large number of men.

Can aspirin prevent prostate cancer?

A new study has reported that a regular intake of low-dose aspirin may help reduce the chances of dying from prostate cancer. Many studies have predicted the benefits of aspirin for preventing cancer, heart attacks, stroke and dementia. But unfortunately, there is a major flaw in these predictions.

Regularly taking a low dose of aspirin is widely promoted as being able to decrease the risk of diagnosis with cancer, including prostate cancer. In fact, low-dose aspirin is also predicted to prevent many other conditions such as heart attack, stroke and dementia. These predictions are based on clinical science. Many studies indicate that people who regularly took aspirin had lower rates of a number of cancers compared to people who didn't take aspirin. The best quality of these studies are long-term, prospective studies that followed people with regular surveys about their habits and health. These are known as cohort studies.

New Australian research targets neuroendocrine prostate tumours.

PCFA has announced its successful research grants for projects starting in 2018. This funding will support trials for new treatments, laboratory research, promising young researchers and

clinicians who are performing research. Two of the projects funded for 2018 are investigating a very aggressive disease called neuroendocrine prostate cancer. This week's research blog describes the recent breakthroughs in our understanding of neuroendocrine prostate cancer.

There are different types of prostate cancer. These cancers have different characteristics because they develop from different types of cells. The most common type of prostate cancer is called **adenocarcinoma**. This form develops from two different types of glandular cells of the prostate, called **basal cells and luminal cells**. There are a number of other different types of prostate cancer that are less common. **Neuroendocrine** prostate cancer is an uncommon form of this cancer that is difficult to treat. Neuroendocrine cancer cells develop from normal (non-cancerous) neuroendocrine cells that are found in the prostate gland. The exact role of normal neuroendocrine cells the prostate is unknown, but they have features similar to nerve cells and cells that secrete hormones.

Prostate tumours sometimes consist entirely of neuroendocrine cancer cells, but these are quite rare. Pure neuroendocrine tumours are very aggressive and resistant to the most conventional treatments for prostate cancer.

PCFA is investing \$5 million in 2018, to fund prostate cancer research that might hold the key to the next breakthrough in the field. Our commitment to our community would not be possible without strong partnerships with leading Australian universities, medical colleges, collaborative clinical trials groups; individual clinicians and researchers; and our funding partners CAN4CANCER, Distinguished Gentleman's Ride, It's a Bloke Thing Foundation and The Movember Foundation.
