April Meeting Report

Our guest speaker for April, Prof Vanessa Hayes, gave a very interesting account of the work she and her colleagues perform at the Garvan Institute in the Laboratory for Human Comparative and Prostate Cancer Genomics. As part of the University of NSW, the 900 researchers at the Kinghorn Centre in Darlinghurst belong to the largest Prostate Cancer study in the world.

To address the complex genomics of early-derived human diversity and prostate cancer, the team is actively involved in adopting new state-of-the-art technologies.

Professor Hayes talked about the nine dot puzzle approach - thinking outside the box.

She explained that with prostate cancer there are no symptoms, no known risk factors, disease heterogeneity (most men die with it not from it), high treatment variability (active surveillance to combined therapies), controversy in PSA testing and no cure for metastatic disease.

Vanessa's research is looking for a way to determine who will die from prostate cancer and is the genomic revolution providing hope for advanced clinical management. Precision management can provide individual treatment using information from a patient's DNA.

The Code of Life DNA has three billion bases (letters) and defines us, including what illnesses we may acquire. One single change in a person's DNA can make things go wrong, but cancer is also a genetic disease that you can inherit from your parents. There are risk factors such as age, environment, family history – if your father or more importantly if your brother has prostate cancer), ethnic origin. There is no definable gene for prostate cancer, unlike breast cancer where BRAC1 and BRAC2 are risk factors.

In the USA, African Americans are at a higher risk than European Americans and Asian Americans and tend to contract the disease ten years younger than the rest of the population.

Research at the Garvan Institute is looking for new markers and trials are underway to find new therapeutic drugs, which take time to be approved. Existing drugs being used for brain/neurological conditions are being tested as potential treatments for prostate cancer.

Anyone can take a tour of the Garvan Institute and it is to be recommended.

We salute the work being done at The Garvan with its internationally recognised researchers. It was a very interesting evening and we thank Vanessa for her time and information.

Can McDonald's fries cure baldness?

Headlines around the world have attracted recent attention claiming a chemical

in McDonald fries holds the cure for baldness.

While this has overstepped the mark somewhat, the original research published in the journal Biomaterials, still warrants attention. The researchers report a new technique that efficiently grows large numbers of human follicle germ structures - the base from which hair grows.

These human follicle germs (or HFGs) were transplanted into the skin of nude mice, where they developed into hair follicles and grew hair shafts. Researchers claim this new technique holds promise for improving current methods of hair regeneration to treat hair loss. This may come as good news to many, as around 1 in 5 of men in their 20s and 2 in 5 men in their 40s are affected by significant balding.

So where does McDonalds enter the story? It seems one of the chemicals (dimethylpolysiloxane) used in the laboratory to grow the human follicle germs is also added to the cooking oil for McDonalds fries to prevent oil splattering.

So, despite the promises made in the headlines, eating fries is still more likely to add to your waistline than to the cover on your head!

MAJOR FUNDING BOOST FOR PROSTATE CANCER IN NSW

11 March 2018

A new \$3.75 million collaborative project aims to accelerate personalised approaches to prostate cancer treatment – and is part of a total package of \$12 million awarded to cancer researchers at Garvan and across NSW.

Almost 6,000 men in NSW will be diagnosed with prostate cancer this year, and more than half that number will die from the disease. Yet all prostate cancer diagnoses are not created equal – and a key challenge is to treat aggressive cancers decisively, while avoiding potentially damaging overtreatment of less aggressive disease.

At Home Testing kits

In the Autumn issue of The Healthy Male, the newsletter of Andrology Australia, there was an article about At-Home PSA Testing Kits. These kits are available to purchase online but are causing controversy as PSA testing is not recommended nor is it necessary for most men unless there is a family history of Prostate Cancer.

The results of these tests may cause fear as a raised PSA result is not specific for cancer. PSA levels naturally increase with age and may indicate inflammation or infection of the prostate (prostatitis).

When the results come through you be advised to visit your local doctor for further review.
